So I'd best get on the ball and write some commentary stuff for the letters page before I once again get swept up in school work here at the good ol' U of Mississippi.

A couple of major protoplasmic announcements need to be made, so let's get those out of the way. First off, in case you're one of those odd readers who skip the cover and go straight to the story, 1991 marks the fifth anniversary of Prometheus' creation, which began humbly enough in a boring science class in 8th grade, a time which seems eons ago now.

Back in 1986, I found myself drawing little "mini-comics" to avoid the drudgery of high school life. These mini-comics got more and more elaborate as time went on, and PROMETHEUS #1-6 form the basis for the series I've got now. PROMETHEUS, the first series, was really for my own pleasure, just a way of expelling those creative energies that tend to build up. In this series, I built a world and entire mythology for my amoeba to inhabit. Bizzare characters ranging from a six-foot tall rabbit with an attitude to an evil mushroom who wanted a certain protoplasm's head on a plate emerged in this series. "Only A Man," the epic that ran from PROMETHEUS #3-6, told the tale of, among other events, the forming of the All-Spongy Squadron, the debut of Ninja Ant and cousin, Prometheus' brief transformation into a superhuman, the final battle between Pro's "evil twin" Kronos and the Squadron, and the introduction of three god-like beings who claim to have *created* Prometheus.

Well, I decided last year I wanted to go for it "for real" this time, and try my hand semi-professionally in the small press arena. I've gotten favorable critical and public reaction to AA# 1 & 2, favorable enough to convince me to continue for quite some time.

So here we are with "The End Of The World As We Know It," and the end of "The Visitor" as well. I kind of surprised myself with how serious the story ended up becoming, awful dramatic for a "funny" book. Some people say that it's easier to write drama than comedy...if that's true, did I take the easy way out? I'm not sure, I think I did what the story called for, but let me know what you think of "The Visitor." Too serious? Too long? Too complicated?

For the next few issues, though, we're having self-contained stories that take place in Spongopolis, so as to show more of this crazy town briefly seen in #1. Next issue we've got the introduction of Raoul the Boy Cockroach and the rampage of the Gorilla Gang, and in #5 our heroes will appear on none other than "Late Night With David Letterman" to celebrate Pro's fifth birthday. Down the line a bit, I've got planned another trilogy that will deal with the mysterious fellow introduced on the very last page of this issue and answer the question: what do all the normal human beings do in this warped universe of mine?

And now for the bad news. Rising costs in printing and postage have forced me to do the unthinkable... AMOEBA ADVENTURES, as of next issue, will be shrunk down to about 3/4 of the size it is now. It's be in what's known as a "digest" size, about the size of a piece of 8 x 11 paper folded in half. I didn't really want to do this, but publishing a 25 or so page magazine is what we call financially idiotic. I couldn't bear to finish off "The Visitor" in anything less than pulse-pounding 8 x 11 size, so next issue will be the tirst in the new pre-shrunk series. The price will go down to around \$1.50-\$1.95 per issue, so there is a bright side. AA looks great. It is by far the best comic unavailable on the market today and I am proud to list it among my comic collection. Each issue seems better than the last, although the first was great and I have only received two. The art on several of the pages in issue two was particularly dynamic, especially page 13. Page 9 was great, it made me laugh a lot, but stop insinuating that "Haw-kuh" is not intimidating. I do have a question about Ninja Ant's powers, however. Does he have a self-regenerating power similar to Wolverine's? On page 18 his left antenna gets pretty much roasted, yet at the bottom of the page his antenna seems healed. How does he get his antenna erect so fast? Is it healing power or his ancient Japanese heritage (ginseng perhaps)? This is highly interesting to me so please reply soon.




