Plus, since I decided on this change after completing most of the *original* #6, this means #7 will follow on the heels of #6 within less than five weeks! Hurrah!





It was incredibly professional and a real eye-opener as to how big small press was then. Only a few issues later, I did the cover for #19 circa around the time Amoeba Adventures #6 came out.

Sadly, Jim Pack passed away just this January at age 68. I'll always be grateful for the worlds he introduced me to.


One of the first advertisements I ever tried to do, published in various places.
