This knee-jerk reaction of people trying to write off the major focus of their industry is not only stupid, but self-destructive. If someone tells a kid of 10 or so, who's reading and loving the new Spider-Man, that it's "crap" and shoves a copy of Love And Rockets under his nose, he'll probably never want to read a comic again.




Then do them yourself. That's what small press is all about.


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






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




























